The trash truck

A TRUCK made from rubbish and powered by old cooking oil is back in the UK after a two year trip around the world!

Andy Pag and Christina Ammon travelled 30,000km in their 'Biotruck' across Europe, the Middle East, Asia and the Americas.

Mr Pag built the truck in 2009, using an old school bus salvaged from a scrap yard. He used recycled materials to turn the truck into a cosy eco-home and then converted the engine so that it could run on cooking oil.

It's called a 'Biotruck' because it runs on biodiesel (or vegetable oil). This includes cooking oil. Fossil fuels such as

petroleum (which makes petrol) will run out one day, so scientists are working on other types of fuel to power vehicles.

Along the journey, the couple got the fuel they needed from restaurants that would otherwise have thrown the oil away.

The truck did break down a few times, but the couple were always helped by people they met on the way.

"The random acts of kindness have given us an overwhelming faith in how great humankind is," said Pag.

After a brief stop in the UK, the couple set off in their truck for the next leg of their journey... to Africa!

Safe zones in the sea

A LIST of 127 areas of sea have been proposed as new nature reserves.

The areas include parts of the sea around the Isle of Wight and the Isles of Scilly, plus reefs, trenches and some remote areas of sea that have hardly been seen by humans.

They range in size from a tiny 0.09 sq km speck of rock near Dorset to a giant 5,800 sq km area of sea in the western Channel. Altogether, it is an area of 37,000 sq km, which is about twice the size of Wales!

As marine conservation zones, the wildlife that live there would be protected, some of them rare or threatened, such as seahorses and sunset cup corals.





Marine minister, Richard Benvon, said: "The thousands of species of sealife and habitats that live hidden under our waters need just as much protection as those that we can see on land."

Rather than being chosen by the Government, the areas were selected after thousands of interviews and meetings with sea users, conservationists and industries, such as fishing and shipping. It is hoped that this process will help to avoid arguments later on.
